


8.0% of Scotland's road km – only Aberdeenshire and Highland and Islands have more.


14.1% of Scotland's motorway km– second only to South Lanarkshire





Dumfries and Galloway rail

8 million Cross Border passenger journeys annually to Scotland, mainly to **London**, the **North West** and **North East of England** .

£151 million in passenger revenue from cross-border journeys originating in Scotland in 2013-14.

107% growth Scotland to Manchester '07 to '15








Dumfries and Galloway residents take the bus less than Scottish adults overall
