I. FOREWORD

Our *Corporate Plan 2008-2011*, published last year, sets out Transport Scotland's delivery priorities for the three-year period. These are firmly focused on helping to achieve the Government's Purpose of increasing sustainable economic growth. The chart on the previous page shows how our priorities are aligned with the Government's strategic objectives and national outcomes.

Our Corporate Plan also sets out in some detail the outcomes we intend to achieve over the Plan period and beyond and the impact these will have across Scotland. This Business Plan sets out the specific tasks we will be undertaking in 2009/10 in our drive to achieve these outcomes.

In the current difficult economic times, an efficient transport system is essential for enhancing productivity and delivering sustainable growth. Transport Scotland is delivering, on behalf of the Scotlish Government, the largest transport investment programme Scotland has ever seen. This programme will support tens of thousands of jobs, almost all of which will be in the private sector. In particular, our continuing investment is helping the hard-pressed construction sector, creating hundreds of new jobs now.

At the same time, we need to continue to take forward our major longer-term projects such as the new Forth Replacement Crossing, the M80 and M74 completion and the Edinburgh-Glasgow and other rail improvement projects. We are also continuing to take forward our green agenda, through electrification of the rail network, greater use of renewable materials in road construction, and encouraging the switch from private cars to public transport, all of which are all crucial in helping to meet the Government's Purpose Target of reducing emissions by 80 per cent by 2050.

Taken together, our ongoing programme of work is making a significant contribution to a number of the Government's Purpose Targets including Economic Growth, Cohesion and Sustainability.

By the end of the year I look forward to delivering:

- A contract to design and build the Replacement Forth Crossing
- Significant progress in the completion of the M74 and the Glasgow Airport Rail Link
- Improved collaboration with Scottish Government colleagues to streamline the planning system
- The commencement of work on the A96 Fochabers and Mosstodloch Bypass, the new railway to the Borders and the improvements on the A75 at Cairntop to Barlae
- A new hourly fast service between Edinburgh and Glasgow via Shotts
- Continued excellence in sustainable construction and maintenance
- Safety enhancements to the A9 and A77
- Enhancements to our partnership working and internal business processes as we strive for excellence in all that we do.

These highlights, and the detail that follows, show that this will be another challenging year for Transport Scotland as we continue to deliver an efficient, cost-effective and sustainable transport system that meets the needs of all the people of Scotland.

2. INTRODUCTION

Transport Scotland seeks to deliver an efficient, cost-effective and sustainable transport system in order to help the Government create a more successful country, with opportunities for all of Scotland to flourish, through increasing sustainable economic growth.

To achieve this our *Corporate Plan 2008-2011* sets out our strategic direction for the three years and our four Delivery Priorities over that period:

- Improved connections across Scotland
- Better journey times, better reliability
- Greener transport alternatives, reduced emissions
- Increased safety, more innovation

This Business Plan sets out what we will do during 2009/10 towards achieving each of these Priorities and also our underpinning strive for excellence in all that we do.

Transport Scotland is accountable to the public through Scottish Ministers, with our Chief Executive reporting directly to the Minister for Transport, Infrastructure and Climate Change. We work closely with the Transport Directorate of the Scottish Government which is responsible for a complementary range of policy and delivery functions including freight, ferries, air services and buses.

As the lead national body for transport we will continue to work closely with all Scottish local authorities and Regional Transport Partnerships to deliver integrated transport solutions which support the local and national outcomes set out in Single Outcome Agreements (SOAs). We will also continue to work collaboratively with a wide range of partners within the transport industry and with bodies from Community Councils to national agencies such as the Scottish Environmental Protection Agency and Scottish Natural Heritage, to ensure that the best solutions are delivered.

RESOURCES

STAFF

We have around 350 staff working in six Directorates: Finance; Major Transport Infrastructure Projects; Rail Delivery; Strategy & Investment; Trunk Roads: Network Management; and Business Improvement & Corporate Services. Our staff have the necessary administrative, specialist and technical skills needed to deliver our priorities.

Our largest skills base is technical expertise in rail and road, with essential support skills including finance, procurement, capital programme management, communications, information technology and professional public policy skills.

FINANCE

The Scottish Budget Spending Review 2007 provides detail of how our spending plans over the next three years will help deliver sustainable economic growth. Transport spending lies within the Government's Finance and Sustainable Growth portfolio, split between Transport Scotland and Transport Directorate.




3. OUR DELIVERY PRIORITIES, 2009/10 TASKS AND TARGETS

As indicated previously, our *Corporate Plan 2008-2011* sets out our four Delivery Priorities and the specific outcomes we aim to achieve over the Plan period. It should be stressed that the majority of our activities deliver on more than just one Delivery Priority, but for simplicity and to avoid duplication we have listed them under the most relevant Delivery Priority.

The following four tables in this Business Plan list our main outcomes and activities under the relevant Delivery Priority and then sets out the specific tasks we will undertake during 2009/10 and the targets we intend to meet. In some cases tasks will be ongoing over a number of years but, wherever possible, we have sought to indicate what aspects will be achieved during the year. The final table sets out what we intend to do as we continuously strive for excellence in everything we do.

Each Directorate in Transport Scotland will also be preparing a more detailed Directorate Business Plan for their area which breaks down further the tasks allocated to them in this Business Plan and will be used as a day-to-day working tool. These in turn, will enable every member of staff within Transport Scotland to ensure that their own individual objectives are fully aligned to the tasks and outcomes of their Directorate and Transport Scotland as a whole. In this way, every member of staff in Transport Scotland will be playing a direct part in helping to achieve the Government's Purpose of increasing sustainable economic growth.





Improved connections across Scotland

Improving transport connections and services across Scotland can open up new markets, increase access to employment and help to build a critical mass of business that drives up competitiveness and delivers sustainable economic growth. In delivering an efficient transport system for Scotland, we need to ensure that everyone in Scotland benefits by providing effective links between people and between communities, both in rural areas and in parts of our larger cities which might otherwise face a degree of isolation. Improved transport connections will enhance the attractiveness of Scotland as a place to live, work and invest as well as supporting communities across the whole of Scotland, bringing them closer together.

Strive for excellence in everything we do
